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It being the indispensable duty of all nations,  
not only to offer up their supplications to  
Almighty God, the giver of all good, for His gracious  
assistance in a time of distress, but also in a solemn  
and public manner, to give Him praise for  
His goodness in general, and especially for great  
and signal interpositions of His Providence  
in their behalf...

# Thanksgiving Proclamation of 1777

Do hereby recommend it to the inhabitants of these States in general, to observe and request the several states to interpose their authority, in appointing and commanding the observation of Thursday the Twenty-eighth day of November as a day of SOLEMN THANKSGIVING to GOD for all His mercies;

and they do further recommend to all ranks to testify their gratitude to God for His goodness by a cheerful obedience to His laws and by promoting, each in his station, and by his influence, the practice of true and undefiled religion, which is the great foundation of public prosperity and national happiness.

Back to Acts

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Miracles – 2:41-47; 3:1-9; 5:12-16, 19-20

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And the world is passing away, and the lust of it; but he who does the will of God abides forever.

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And we closed last week with Hebrews 12:1-2

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Therefore we also, since we are surrounded by so great a cloud of witnesses (we are not alone), let us (our action) lay aside every weight, and the sin which so easily ensnares us, and let us (our action) run with endurance the race that is set before us, (how) looking unto Jesus, the author and finisher of our faith, who for the joy that was set before Him endured the cross, despising the shame, and has sat down at the right hand of the throne of God.

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But does God provide victory over “besetting sins”?

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All we have to do is trust Him at His Word.

Let's do that together today.

1 John 1:9

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The forgiveness part we accept, but the cleansing from all unrighteousness (our victory over our besetting sins) is more difficult to accept.

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If we confess (to admit, concede, to openly acknowledge) our sins (plural), (then) He is faithful and just to (1) forgive us our sins (plural – what we just confessed) and to (2) cleanse (to purify from the power and guilt of sin, to be free from filth and defilement), us from all (*pás*) unrighteousness (what is wrong, wicked, impure, an offense to God).

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Then let's test God in this (Mal. 3:10).
